



Alexis Wichowski is a public servant, teacher, and writer. She currently serves with the newly founded US Digital Corps at the Technology Transformation Service for the federal government and teaches on policy, media, and technology at Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs.

Prior public service includes: Deputy Chief Technology Officer for Innovation, Acting DCTO for Broadband, and Acting Director of Communications for the CTO (City of New York); Associate Commissioner, Department of Veterans' Services (City of New York); Program Officer Office of eDiplomacy, Diplomatic Innovation Division (US Department of State); Director of Media Analysis & Strategy (Permanent Mission of the United States to the United Nations); Disaster Relief Field Responder (American Red Cross of Greater New York). She's also led crisis response work, including NYC's COVID-19 PPE coordination in spring of 2020 and Ground Zero field response on and after 9/11.

Awards includes: OPM's Presidential Management Fellowship; two Meritorious Honor Awards; Distinguished Dissertation Award; "Women in Technology" award;" Columbia SIPA student-nominated teaching award; NYC[x] Tech & Innovation Award; and a Fulbright. Outside government, Wichowski has worked in media impact, information architecture, academic book indexing, web coding, theater production, foreign sitcoms, and pretzel vending.
